Police and Educators Active in Children's Education

One of NASRO's newest members is truly a *Peace Officer*. PEACE stands for *Police and Educators Active in Children's Education*. Officer Tim Durkin fills the role of PEACE officer and SRO at Maplewood Middle School located in Maplewood Township, New Jersey. He started in October 2002 by introducing himself and his role at assemblies. He also met with parents, faculty, business owners and neighbors of the school. Durkin completed the NASRO Basic Course in March 2003 at the Essex Co. Police Academy, New Jersey.

His work assignments are a hybrid of the traditional SRO. He works four days a week, ten-hour days and starts at 11:00 a.m. most days. After school, twice a week, Durkin hosts an open gymnasium program. He has chaperoned school dances, makes home visits and patrols the village-shopping district on Friday nights, where youth congregate.

His principal expressed the impact Durkin is having by teaching respect towards others and personal responsibility. Durkin has a unique way of staying in touch with his students' feelings. A photo of himself in eighth grade attending the same middle school hangs on his office wall.

PEACE was created through a collaborative effort between the South Orange/Maplewood Board of Education, school administrators, teachers, school social workers, parent teacher associations, business associations, neighborhood associations and the police department.

Sergeant John Perna wrote this innovative grant funding the PEACE program. The grant is from the Edward Byrne Memorial State and Local Law Enforcement Assistance Program, www.ncjrs.org/html/bja/edbyrne. The awards are for use by states and local government to improve the criminal justice system, with emphasis on violent crime and serious offenders. Maplewood obtained it through *New Jersey's Safe Schools and Communities Grant Program* to reduce youth violence and delinquency, which are negatively impacting communities and schools.
